

Ecosystem Management and Forestry

Overview of Major: EMF focuses on the conservation and restoration of the earth's natural resources through hands-on study of the ecology, stewardship, and management of forest, woodland, and grassland ecosystems. The program offers an accredited specialization in Forestry and Natural Resource Management.

Minimum Admission Requirements: Must be completed by the end of spring term preceding fall enrollment.

Admissions Review Process:

- Holistic review: Based on combination of academic and non-academic achievements
- Includes personal essay, coursework, test scores, interest in the major and field. A strong interest in the major, and a thoughtful essay

Helpful Things to Know:

- IGETC satisfies Reading & Composition only.
- Completion of an 8-week, 11 unit Summer Field Program in Plumas County, California is required for the Forestry specialization (optional for the Natural Resource Specialization) and is strongly encouraged for the summer before attending Berkeley (http://forestrycamp.berkeley.edu).
- The Forestry specialization is accredited by the Society of American Foresters and provides four years of qualifying education or professional experience for licensing as a professional forester in California.
- The program has a strong alumni network and one of the lowest student-faculty ratios in the College of Natural Resources.
- Students are eligible for a series of endowed scholarships based on academic performance and financial need.
