Charles Sellers, born September 9, 1923 in Charlotte, NC is an American Historian, emeritus, University of California, Berkeley. He attended Harvard University as an undergraduate in History and Literature and, after serving in the ski troops at Camp Hale, Colorado during World War II, graduated from Harvard in 1947 (class of 1945), magna cum laude. He received a PhD in American History from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill in 1950. From 1958-1990, he taught at the University of California, Berkeley. He is the author of a 2 volume biography of James K. Polk (Princeton University Press, 1957, 1966), volume 2 of which won the Bancroft Prize in American History in 1967 and of The Market Revolution, Jacksonian America, 1815-1846 (Oxford University Press, 1991). In 1964, he was a Visiting Professor at El Colegio de Mexico and in 1970 was the Harmsworth Visiting Professor at Oxford University, UK. A major symposium on his work was held in London in 1995 resulting in The Market Revolution in America, edited by Melvyn Stokes and Stephen Conway (University Press of Virginia, 1996).
